HMS Edgar was a 72-gun third rate ship of the line of the Royal Navy, built by Baylie of Bristol and launched in 1668. By 1685 she was carrying 74 guns.

In May 1689 Edgar saw action in the <u>Nine Years' War</u> under the command of <u>Cloudesley Shovell</u>, who later became <u>Admiral of the Fleet</u> and after injuries in the <u>Scilly naval disaster of 1707</u> he would die. During this war, Edgar was present at the first fight of the <u>Battle of Bantry Bay</u> when a French fleet was landing troops against <u>King William III</u>.

In 1700 Edgar underwent a rebuild at <u>Portsmouth Dockyard</u> as a 70-gun ship. She was rebuilt for a second time by Burchett of <u>Rotherhithe</u> as a 70-gun ship to the <u>1706 Establishment</u>, relaunching on 31 March 1709.

Edgar was destroyed by fire at <u>Spithead</u>, <u>Hampshire</u> in 1711. All on board perished. The wrecked was cleared in May 1844.
