 shall haue the deth that nowe lyes in with all belonging thereto And I do give unto my
 sonne Edward my Barber and one of my daugthers Marye beinge after my wifes decease
 dooing unto my daughter Marye his dwelling to be ayed her selfe in thred mouthes
 after my decease I do give to my Denn Grantham twelue pinte apiece to be paid
 her in thre within a yere after my decease And the rest of my goods and Chattells as
 whatsoeuer I do give and bequeath unto my beloved wife whom I do appoint my
 whole executrix of this my last will and Testament for the tyme of her naturall
 life And my will is after her decease that all the goods that beare with my wifes

poundes of his lawfull mony of England. Item generally summed to be paide
with my executors next after my decease by my executors And as for all the rest of my
goods chattells and chattells of tenementes quid and bequeath unto my well beloved
wife Elizabeth whom I make and ordayne my sole and only executrix of this my last
will and testament And of the due execution therof my debts and legacies paid and audited
by my trusty and well beloved wchchd I have hir unto putt my hand and seale the

the summe of fourty pounds to be paid her when she attaine to the age of one
and twentie yeaers. All quid unto my sonne John Robbed the younger a summe
