	Aug 8th		<p>On the morning of August 8th the Germans made 4 counter attacks on our position in 5th Avenue.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>① On our left flank at 3 am. They made a bombing attack and got into our trenches but were immediately driven out.</li> <li>② At the same place they attempted a second attack at 7.30 am which was easily repulsed.</li> <li>③ Simultaneously with ① the enemy made a determined attack on the barricade which formed the right flank of our position in 5th AVENUE. The enemy employed Flammeswerfer and under cover of smoke got into the trench. After hard hand to hand fighting they were driven out and beyond the barricade.</li> <li>④ At 5.30 am. They repeated the attack and this time succeeded in getting into the trench and compelling our men to withdraw down the trench. A fresh barricade was erected about 30 yards from the old one and the men were checked there. While supervising the construction of this barricade the Company commander, Lt. F. J. L. EDWARDS who had conducted the defense with great gallantry was wounded, &amp; succumbed to his wounds 2 days later. Lt. G. M. HUGHES who was said to be wounded during the first attack was found to be missing and Lt. H. CROWhurst was accounted by bombing.</li> </ul> <p>The operations were preceded by an intense preliminary bombardment in the course of which Lt. H. M. THURSTON, Lt. A. BIDMEAD and Sgt. J. SHIPTON were wounded.</p>

VERMELLES	28-9-15		<p>Personal message from General Gough (1st Corps) exclaims that owing to the situation the attack was imperative.</p> <p>Cos moved in file to the dangerous A. B C D. HQ &amp; MGs. Here the battalion formed up in Company Column and advanced towards the objective 300 yards away. During the advance two lines of captured German trenches and two lines of barbed wire had to be crossed - these were manned by British troops.</p> <p>Owing to the bright moon light the enemy saw us advancing when we were 400 yards from our objective (FOSS E). They put up "Very" light and kept up a continuous rifle fire on us from our right front. This gave cover as no gas was used.</p> <p>The battalion advanced steadily, A, B and part of C Cos going straight for the Fosse. They were unable owing to the heavy fire from the enemy who by this time were manning the top of the fosse to gain the slag heap being about 70 yards from it. D and part of C Cos meanwhile advanced and manned the front British trench.</p> <p>During this time 2nd Lieut A B Turner singlehanded bombed down a German communication trench during the enemy before him a distance of over 150 yards. During the whole of this period the Germans were throwing bombs at 2/1 Turner. While performing this very gallant act he was mortally wounded. By this time it was known that the C.O. Major Bird was wounded and Capt Radford DSO 2nd in command was killed.</p>

Seeing that the first two companies were checked Colonel Carter gave Captain Frayell the order to charge with the remainder men available. This order was carried out - the leading men with Captain Frayell in front got half way up the slag heap when the Germans from the top threw bombs on our heads. This checked our further advance and the men retired to the front British trench a distance of 150 yards.</p> <p>As it was now getting daylight and the men were all rather exhausted Colonel Carter decided not to attack again. He ordered Capt. Frayell to re-organise in our old trenches.</p> <p>Casualties: Killed Capt. M. Bradford 750. Died of wounds Lt A B Turner.</p> <p>Missing: Capt. G. G. Total 288.</p> <p>The death of Captain Bradford cannot be too much deplored. He was a very gallant officer and his loss is very keenly felt by everyone in the regiment and brigade. He was buried at Vermelles.</p>



Handwritten Report of the Campaign

On the night of the 16<sup>th</sup> August 1877 the Battalion moved up into the hills proceeding in single file. Orders to the command of the one or two thousand natives of the Amazons to attack at dawn were announced in Yunnanese, heaving long and loud shouting.

The attack was over bounded up the hills very high up to the head of the Dabakian and across very high across in spite of considerable hostile fire from our comrades in their difficult positions being captured.

The attack on the Green Line commenced about 0500 hrs as directed by the Officer on the spot Major H.D. Clark on the Green Line and was unopposed until the right company (B.) took over the defence of the Rishi Bank where the other two companies supported him continued the attack.

From this time onwards there was fierce fighting where the natives advanced the attack was continued and the Green Line part of Yunnan took regular turns to repel the attack until it fell into our hands a further advance being captured.

Our right wing holding Keay Loumee and held up by a strong point (Villages) probably Ballon cage (or short ones nearby).

The left wing with Capt T. W. Williams and a party of Gordon's captured a hill which was strongly held and the Green Line was held in certain places.

The Royal Irish Rifles were sent up with orders to move up to meet the main body advancing from up river with 300 men through the village of the

Tankai and Siam (Krao) on the northern side of the

There were a certain number of men on the forward edge  
of our front  
Opposite General's Hill one was very weak and ready  
to give up. I.M.B. had made it impossible to reorganise, some time  
earlier in the morning when our Brig. R. had been  
killed. A week before one of the Guards came up in support  
of Battalion Head and it was in full Red in combat dress.

On 5 P.C. S.L. about 9.30 AM. G. Monks were noticed forming up on the right  
about 10.30 AM. a strong column which  
should in full one, and at 10.30 AM. a strong column which  
commenced to move advancing on our front and from E.S.E.  
and southwards towards our left flank. But were very hardly  
so thoroughly reliable as British Lancers.

Our casualties on the west of the river had happened on our front  
and the Germans attacked in great force  
according to the accounts of the men they appeared to have  
from a ruined building opposite.  
The enemy suffered considerable casualties but our force  
was driven in and the Division on marching up captured  
1000 German men.

The lances were replaced by General Monks to offer S.S.C.

Regimental Aid Post.

The Regimental Aid Post will be established as near Battalion HQs. as possible and will move forward with it. In circumstances permitting (for instance, there may be a rush of cases when the Aid Post would remain behind and follow on later), as soon as a Fresh Aid Post has been formed H.Q.s. will be notified of its position which will be indicated by a red cross board and two direction arrows.

Instructions to Regimental Stretcher Bearers.

Each Company will have 6 bearers and 3 stretchers. In the advance from our present front line towards the GREN LINE, wounded cases are to be dressed and no stretcher is to be left behind with a living down case. Living down cases are to be placed in a trench or dugout if possible.

If only shell holes are available, one should be chosen near some prominent landmark. Stretcher bearers are to work from the most forward area backwards after our final objective has been obtained.

Evacuation from the Regimental Aid Post

Evacuations from the Regimental Aid Post will be carried out by the R.A.M.C. two stretcher squads of which will be attached to this Battalion during operations.
